
International Art Contest "The Future We Want"





The Future We Want

The United Nations marked its 75th anniversary at a time of great disruption for the world. In the face of all the challenges that erupted, it is essential that we come together and discuss our priorities and how we can build the future that we want for all of us. In order to do so, earlier this year the Perception Change Project of the Office of the Director-General of UN Geneva ran an online art contest titled "The Future We Want". The contest aimed to foster a conversation about what kind of future we want for our world and how we can empower youth to work towards it.

Permanent Missions to the UN in Geneva were invited to submit an artwork by an artist from their country. 44 artworks were submitted in total, representing all 5 continents. The public were then invited to vote for their preferred artworks via a dedicated website; close to 17,000 votes were cast from around the globe.

The 10 artworks that received the most votes were reviewed by an international jury of nine art-knowledgeable children, formed with the support of UNIS and WFP. The youth jury selected the 3 overall winners of the contest:

> "Wall" by Sigita Maslauskaitė-Mažylienė, submitted by the Permanent Mission of Lithuania.
> "Diversity Crowd" by Luigi Olivadoti, submitted by the Permanent Mission of Liechtenstein.
> "The future that we dream - a harmonious world of coexistence" by Zhao Peizhi, submitted by the Permanent Mission of the People's Republic of China.

The Director-General of UN Geneva, Ms. Tatiana Valovaya, selected an additional winner from the remaining short-listed artworks: "Maria Bertha" by Leca Araujo, submitted by the Permanent Mission of Brazil.

A book about the 3 winners will shortly be published and the winner of the Director-General's prize will also be invited to display a solo exhibition of their wider body of work in the Palais des Nations. Many of the submitted artworks were displayed in the Palais des Nations for over a month.

The exhibition was then installed in the D10 art space to allow the broader public to enjoy it from 15 December 2020 until 15 January 2021.

The Perception Change Project

The Perception Change Project (PCP) aims to highlight the impact of the work done by all the UN and international organizations, non-governmental organizations and other institutions based in Geneva. Its objective is to broaden the overall understanding of the importance of the work carried out by International Geneva, not only in the context of humanitarian assistance, peacekeeping or global health, but also to everyday life.

Spearheaded by the UN Geneva Director-General Tatiana Valovaya, the project is managed by a small team at the Office of the Director-General. The project has over 100 partners including numerous UN agencies and offices, international organizations, NGOs and governmental entities.

The work of the PCP is centered around four main axes: making information accessible, changing the narrative, promoting the work of Geneva-based organizations and promoting the Sustainable Development Goals.
 The different programs of the PCP include mapping, infographics, children's books, booklets, youth outreach events, exhibitions, campaigns, and many more.


Lithuania "Wall" Winner 1st place Sigita Maslauskaitė-Mažylienė

The characters in the painting are looking over a wall towards a future they desire, but are separated from it. The iconography of the subject of refugees can be found anywhere from 6th century BC papyri to the portals of Gothic cathedrals, from Rembrandt to K. Kollwitz. A refugee is somebody who is being persecuted for their religion, race, citizenship or political beliefs, as well as somebody who cannot return to their normal life due to fear or illness. Being separated behind a wall is a state common to all human beings and an eternal subject.



Liechtenstein "Diversity Crowd" Winner 2nd place Luigi Olivadoti

The motif represents the different citizens from two neighboring countries. People with different religions and views, sexual orientation or geographical origin march together in a colorful parade.



People's Republic of China "The future that we dream — a harmonious world of coexistence" Winner 3rd place Zhao Peizhi

The ideal future in my mind is a beautiful world of peace, equality, freedom, love and sunshine. People on earth live in harmony with nature and animals, love each other and share a common future.



Brazil "Maria Bertha" Winner of the DG's Prize Leca Araujo

"Maria Bertha" pays tribute to Bertha Lutz, a scientist, politician and diplomat. One of the four women to sign the UN charter in 1945, she was among the most prominent advocates for including women's rights in it.



Arab Republic of Egypt "A dream tomorrow" Sherein Mostaf Ali Abozaid

My dream is that as a woman tomorrow, I will be happier and communicate with others and nature, and leave a trace of the rest in the hearts of others.



Armenia "Eudaimonia" David Danielyan

Ancient philosopher Plato designed two worlds. He characterizes this by creating a distinction between the sensible world and the intelligible world, which is Eudaimonia or Happiness.
Eudaimonia invisible, non-physical, and consisting of the Forms, can only be apprehended by the soul, for the soul shares in qualities of that likeness.



Austria "Shopping Cart Motor Home" Rainer PROHASKA

"Nonsense Technology" is an artistic concept and strategy combining science, art and technology. Through functionality, installations, objects or specially designed machines are designed to inspire considering the promises associated with technological development. Seeming to be a makeshift flat on wheels, without practical dimension, it embodies the counterculture idea of Do It Yourself, thus humorously depicting our unconditional trust in technology.



Azerbaijan "The Universe" Rashad Mehdiyev

This painting has become the embodiment of a bright future where the depth of the human spirit and the value of life are at the forefront of everything. The mystical maiden shows a wonderful world where each of us is part of the universe.



Belarus "The Full Moon" Dr. Ekaterina Kenigsberg

Happiness is an opportunity to open the window on a summer night, to see a huge bright moon in a clear cloudless sky, to breathe the smell of herbs and flowers, and to know that tomorrow will be a new nice day.



Belgium "General Assembly" Lieven Lefere & Charles Verraes



Cabo Verde "Dawn of a new day" Tchalê Figueira




Cambodia "Culture of Peace" Chhim Sothy

Honduras "Left Behind" Keyla Hannani Morel Salgado




Hungary "Organic" László Herbszt

Iceland "Melting snow in spring" Guðrún Kristjánsdóttir

Fog creeps around the mountain so the forms lose their sharpness. Snow in a mountainside is something future generations should be able to experience.



Israel "Freedom" Orna Ben-Ami

Bars that turn to free birds, an iron wall sculpture that expresses the will for freedom. Freedom of expression, the freedom of movement to wherever wishes, the freedom to practice religion and freedom of belief, the freedom to vote and think. A dream for a better world for everyone.



Kazakhstan "The Flight To Freedom" Ralina Abibullayeva

My inspiration is to present freedom as a universal and humankind heritage of the VE75. Presented right in the centre, painted in oils there is a dove, spreading its wings wide embracing the sky, which is painted in multiple bright and monotone colours. The dove is painted in purple on the inside and some of the interior of was painted in the same colour. The eyes are not clearly visible, suggesting our loss of touch with freedom and that we are unable to live life with full enjoyment. The meaning of this piece of artwork is directly related to our current difficult COVID pandemic, in which we are isolated and unable to be free and be ourselves to create the future we so desperately desire. In a form of the dove, I wanted to show how beautiful, colourful, breathtaking and precious freedom is to us now and how we should understand the value it has to us.



México "Crossing Reality Portal" Alejandro Darío Pizarro Chellet

This painting depicts the refugee welcome sign used by organizations that provide help to refugees.

In this artwork, the artist is portraying a family running through two pillars that symbolize a political and psychical border. This family is urging to get through the other side to become safe from a reality that is collapsing. Perhaps this family will be able to cross a portal into a better and more fair

reality of the world?



Montenegro "Immunization" Maja Šofranac

Immunization is a work inspired by the human immune system as a defense mechanism against disease. The broader framework of the work is placed in the context of the healing of modern man and society from the ubiquitous deviations on the path of personal and collective growth, development and realization of all its potentials.



Philippines "Untitled Land" Joel L. Geolamen

The future we want is a world where natural resources are protected and conserved, and the environment is well taken care of, with ecosystems preserved. Ancestral lands should be distributed not as commercial ventures but to be guarded and nurtured, given due importance and value.



Portugal Untitled work Carlos Correia

This untitled work, from a series named "quadro-mesa" [table-painting], depicts an austere interior scene, devoid of recognisable elements. The painting, which bears the subtitle "Devir" [Becoming], is a vessel of emotions that we project onto the colour planes, which organise themselves with balanced intensity in the composition.



Republic of Korea "White Nogodan Peak View" JIN HEE LAN

In 'White Nogodan Peak View', the author portrays the panoramic view she encountered herself from the top of Jirisan at one of its peaks, Nogodan. Viewers could easily relate to this work of art as it embodies an escape from everyday life and presents a peaceful rest.



Romania "Look towards the future" Delia PERROIS

The window, as an opening towards the air and the light, is outlined on a flowered spring garden, symbolizing the hope of the young people to live in a better world,

in accordance with the commitments assumed in the Charter of the United Nations. "The Future We Want" is a promise of a wonderful dream, which will come true.



Serbia "Birds on the wires of our destiny" Rastko Ćirić

A hand that is reaching out is a greeting saying: I am unarmed and I have nothing to hide. The hand reaches out for the skies. The lines on the palm that represent destiny are wires for birds to land! Birds are a symbol of freedom.



Switzerland "H.E.R.A.L.D.R.Y" Viktor Tibay

H.E.R.A.L.D.R.Y evokes the humanitarian identity of Geneva and the United Nations with humour, optimism and lightness. Freely inspired by the heraldic protocols of coats of arms, H.E.R.A.L.D.R.Y is part of a series of 17 flags that takes up, associates, cuts out and juxtaposes UN pictograms. Through the staging of landscapes, characters and objects, each flag sketches narratives and evokes paintings.
